

DECLG Statement of Strategy 2015-2017




- * To manage our valuable water resources, including the provision of effective and efficient water services which enhance our economic potential and support our demographic needs.

GWP/OECD – Water investment supporting economic and social well-being


Conceptual framework of the dynamic of water security and sustainable growth






